Did you know? If you bring in unused postcards to the post office, you can exchange them for new postcards or postage stamps. It costs about 5円 per postcard to process the exchange, but if you find yourself with an excess of unused nengajyo, you can get some of your money back by trading them in. Keep in mind this only works for unused

postcards and postcards that have a postage stamp which hasn't been marked with a cancellation.



February Around the World



"Carnival: The Season of Indulgence"



Carnival, also known as Shrovetide, Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday, is celebrated in more than 50 countries worldwide. The tradition of Carnival originates from the Roman Catholic tradition of Lent, a period of strict fasting between Ash Wednesday and Easter when Christians refrain from eating meat, drinking alcohol, and consuming other indulgent items. The items given up for Lent vary across different communities, and in the modern day it's common for individuals to choose a personal vice, such as chocolate or coffee, to abstain from during Lent.

In the past, Christian communities would prepare for the Lent season by consuming all of their meat, alcohol, and other indulgent products in the days leading up to Ash Wednesday so that food would not go to waste during the Lent season. Modern day Carnival stems from this period of indulgence prior to Lent, and now includes a wide variety of festive traditions with every culture adding their own unique twists.

Carnival also celebrates the reversal of everyday rules and norms, including social hierarchies, and many cultures take the time to celebrate all of humanity as equals, regardless of position or status. Carnival parade floats with expressions of social and political satire are a common Carnival tradition, as well as the donning of masks to grant equalizing anonymity.

Rio de Janeiro

The Rio Carnival in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil is regarded as the largest Carnival festival in the world. Alternatively named "The Biggest Show on Earth," the Rio Carnival parade is characterized by elaborate floats, colorful costumes, and lively *Samba* music. Outside of the main festivities, smaller street festivals take place all over the city, creating a festive atmosphere for all the residents. Samba schools, communities of Samba musicians, compete throughout the year for the honor of preforming in the "Sambadrome" during Rio Carnival. Each Samba school takes great pride in preparing music, elaborate costumes, and dance routines which all work in harmony to convey a story.





Venice

Venetian Carnival is world famous for its traditional masquerade. The practice of wearing masks in Venice started as a political rebellion against strict social classes, with the masks providing anonymity for nobles and commoners alike. Now, festival goers don unique and elaborate masks, some of which are designed to represent characters from classic Italian theatre.

Asbestos Bath Mat Product Recall

A product recall has been issued for several diatomaceous earth bath mat varieties sold at Nitori and other home goods retailers in the last year. Some of these products were found to contain potentially hazardous amounts of asbestos. The mats on their own aren't too dangerous, but they are designed to be cleaned by lightly sanding the surface, which generates dust. Asbestos dust is toxic, and inhaling or ingesting it can lead to serious health risks. If you own a diatomaceous earth bath mat, please check the link below for the list of products included in the recall.

The city has requested that these mats NOT be thrown away with city trash. If you find that your bath mat is on the recall list, please wrap it in plastic and take it back to the store where you purchased it. Retailers will collect the mats and dispose of them safely.
