

Asparagus + Bacon Harumaki

Ingredients

10 spring roll (harumaki) wrappers

10 stalks of asparagus

10 rashers of bacon

A little potato starch (katakuriko) dissolved in water

Method

1. Cut off the tough end of the asparagus stalks and peel the bottom half of the remaining stalks to make it more tender.

2. Lay out the wrappers with the corner towards you. Place the bacon across the middle, and the asparagus on the corner closest to you. Start wrapping tightly!

3. Seal with a little starchy water and fry until golden. Itadakimasu!

While talking to Nola, we learned that since starting at the General Consul of Japan in Nashville, she did a presentation at a Sakura Festival on April 9! Ganbatte Nola!

Q. Hey, Nola! How are you?

I'm doing pretty good, but I'm having a little trouble with the time difference! Today (April 15) is Good Friday, part of Easter weekend, so I have 3 days off from today. Tomorrow my dad asked me to go to a Japanese restaurant in Nashville with him. Dad says he wants to know if it's "real" Japanese food, which is why he has asked me along to check, haha!

Q. Your family must be happy to have you home!

Yes! My mom was the happiest, I think. Yesterday it was my turn to make dinner, but my mom went ahead and made it anyway. I asked her, "What are you doing?!" "You're too slow," she said. We went back and forth like that. It's hard getting into a new rhythm sometimes, but we're all enjoying it.


Q. How's your new job?

My job here is actually a lot like working at AWIA! I've only been on the job for 4 days, but on April 9 we had our biggest event, the Nashville Cherry Blossom Festival. We set up a yukata fitting corner, and held various cultural workshops such as Bon dancing, kanji, and koto.

I talked about the JET Program and life in Japan during the pandemic. There were so many people that came to experience Japanese culture. I was a little surprised and impressed to see how popular it was with Americans!

Q. Are you very busy?

After the big event, while everyone else was relaxing and cooling down, I was washing and ironing the 40 happi coats and 35 yukata worn by the staff. It took me an hour to do the first three! They're hung all over my house; they're supposed to go into a storage closet at the Consul General, but it got pretty messy in the 2 months between my predecessor leaving and me arriving, haha! I'll have to organize that first. Then, my main

Q. What are some of your memories of AWIA?

I remember most how friendly everyone was, which made the office feel very homely. We worked well as a team! Now my workplace has about 4 times the number of employees, so there are some that I don't encounter often, and we're not as close.

I was also really happy to create and participate in a lot of events. Halloween, Valentines Day, hiking...I enjoyed them all. Here the events are all predetermined, so I won't get to create my own.

Q. What advice do you have for those of us here in Aizu?

I feel that you're a little behind on utilizing technology... there are no fax machines here! Haha! And it's mostly cashless. I was surprised by how busy and lively the city was when I first came back. Aizuwakamatsu is so quiet. I feel like that might be a big hurdle for younger residents; there aren't so many opportunities to meet and hang out with other young people. I think you need more events and opportunities like Uniship, the youth sports circle at AWIA!

Q. It felt like you were always at the heart of our events and exchanges. Did you find it hard to make friends despite that?

If I wasn't a part of the AWIA, I don't think I would have met or made many friends. It's hard enough to make foreign friends; Japanese friends are even harder! Almost impossible... At the AWIA though, people who want to make connections gather, which is really helpful if you're wanting to meet new friends!

The friends I made in Aizu (both foreign and Japanese) I can honestly say are very close and dear to me. I want everyone to enjoy their lives in Aizu. Find new friends through the AWIA, do what makes you happy. If there's something you enjoy doing, use the AWIA's resources and make it happen, make friends doing it! If you like skiing but don't want to go alone, find some AWIA people and go with them! I did the same, and had a blast; I hope you all will too.
