# To the treasures of this diverse world: know yourself and be yourself!

# Q: Mr. Sasao, you're from Fukuoka. People from Fukuoka have a reputation for being very blunt. Were you surprised by anything when you came to Fukushima?

There was, yeah. At first, I figured I should watch my words. I worried that people might think I'm rude, haha As they say: 'When in Rome, do as Romans do.' However, doing that I felt like I was losing my identity. It made me realise it's important to be authentic with others.

# Q: The High School Students really liked you! They said you are a good speaker, and a fantastic listener!

I tried to speak to the students frankly. For better or worse, I often say what I think. There were a few students who have trouble talking with adults, so I was careful and I tried to say things like: 'I see where you're coming from, but—I think OO.' I wanted to listen to them carefully and answer honestly.

#### Q: What do you think now after talking with the students?

They are like precious stones. Depending on how you polish them, they can really shine. Even students that started out quiet were able to be more talkative by the end. I wish I could have had more time with them. They're really the hope of our future. I was never like that in my time though

#### Q: Why did you want to become a JICA Volunteer?

I first heard about JICA on TV. I'd been working at a health insurance company for about eight years, and I hadn't been overseas. I knew wasn't going to be at that company forever, so I went to an info session and met so many wonderful people. I joined and I was sent as a volunteer to Bolivia and even learned Spanish! I never thought my life would head in this direction.

#### Q: What did you do in Bolivia?

I taught people about things like separating trash, the 3Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle,) and told them how it's done in Japan. Since Japanese people aren't very common over there, one time, a crowd gathered like I was a celebrity. Overall, I don't know if I made a huge difference, but I discovered that I'm pretty good at languages and can live pretty much anvwhere.

#### Q: Do you have any personal goals for the future?

I'm interested in both sides of JICA's Developing Nations Education Program: the glamourous and the rough. If I could, I think I want to help those in need more. Seeing the street children in Bolivia really opened my eyes, though I don't think money will solve the world's problems. In the end, I believe if you dream big, put yourself into new situations, and then end up failing; it's enough to be able to pass your experience on to someone who can.

#### Q: Could you give any advice to us at AWIA?

The great part about AWIA is that it is not stuck inside City Hall, so you can just chat, and build a network with the people you meet there. This is unlike any other place. Though, it has to be more than that. Create connections and follow things through with people, and projects. I think you should review your strategies for engagement as well. It would be great to have more events where young people can gain experience, and confidence, and where high school students can gain valuable experience for their future as independent adults.

Actually, my very first task after moving to Fukushima was to introduce myself to AWIA. During my year and a half here, I met and interacted with many members and students. My work feels a little half-finished, but maybe this will be good for me. If there is an opportunity in the future, I hope I can grow and support AWIA in new ways.
