

Member Spotlight: Michael and Mikiko Cohen

Michael and Mikiko are an American-Japanese couple. Michael Cohen is American, and has worked at the University of Aizu since it started 30 years ago. Mikiko has experience working in English. They both love nature and outdoor activities and have been together for a long time.





We interviewed Michael and Mikiko about their relationship.

Q: What was your first impression of each other?

Michael: We met by chance at a Tokyo chess club, and we happened to be sitting next to each other. I don't really remember it, but I think we had fun? Well, we went out every day the follow week anyway.

Mikiko: I thought he was a bit weird. He had a pencil tucked behind his ear! We happened to leave at the same time, and since it was raining, we shared an umbrella to the station. We exchanged business cards, and WOW he was a professor! He didn't look like one, haha Later, he called me up and asked me out.

Michael: I wanted to go biking with her, so I bought her a bike. We went to date spots like Inokashira Park, and Kichijoji Temple, the movies etc. We went to the Bridgestone Museum of Art* all the time. About a year later, we got married. (*now the Artizon Museum)

Q: Why did you move to Aizu, and what did you think? Michael: In a Sound Research Journal, I saw that the University of Aizu opened in 1993 and was looking for teachers. I told her, "hey, I'm thinking of applying here..." Mikiko: I thought "Aizu? I think I went there for a school trip in Junior High" and that was about it. I never thought that I, born and raised in Tokyo, would be raising my kids in Tohoku. Back then, the City was doing all it could to support and welcome the University of Aizu foreign staff. When we moved, 3 whole volunteers came to help out, holding the baby, going out with me to buy toilet paper and all that. It was a huge help. In our apartment building, there were Chinese, Russian, Brazilian, and Korean people all living there. I was the only Japanese person. During the day, there was no one there, and since I wasn't used to the rural lifestyle, I was quite lonely.

Q: What language do you use together?

Michael: It's usually English. However, when we fight, she switches to Japanese and so it drags on twice as long. She says her rant in Japanese and then gives the English version. Mikiko: When I'm mad, it just comes out. I've got to say "kono @&\$#!!" and then I say it again in English. I know I've got to get myself understood. I learned English while on exchange in America, and then I've had jobs where I used a lot of English. He's also worked so hard to learn Japanese.

Q: Do you have any advice for those who may marry outside of their culture?

Michael: It's just like any other marriage. Sometimes you have to compromise, like "yes, whatever." My mother always said, "it's not half and half; you give your all, and get half back." It's also important to be able to do your own thing. She really likes Korean dramas, but I don't. 20 years ago, we would be fighting over the remote, but now it's fine because we each have our own screen/tablet.

Mikiko: Yeah, you really can't assume your partner thinks the same. It's about acceptance. Now it's completely different from when we grew up; more tolerant. You have to understand that my 'normal' is not my partner's 'normal.'

Q: Looking back at your relationship, frankly, how is it?

Michael: It's not bad! I am very lucky. Talking with her with fun, and I love being with her. She looks the same as the day I met her. My room always looks like an earthquake hit it, with stuff everywhere, and when I'm working, you can't see the table. She is always well put together. I'm so grateful to have been with her for the past 30 years. I don't know if I would have made it this long if I'd never met her. Truly grateful. Mikiko: hmmm, this is all I know, haha He's got a strong personality, so I think I might be doing good? There may be really strict husbands out there, but he's not like that. I'm so thankful he's always said; "go right ahead, do as you like." Letting me live my life, so I too can say "go right ahead, do as you like."

Michael: It's been a good 30 years. I've lived half of my life here in Aizu. We swim in Inawashiro in the summer, and bike to Kitakata, Ashinomaki, and the old road to Inawashiro in spring and autumn. In winter, the family all ski together. Mikiko has pretty much skied since we moved to Aizu, though I learned to snowboard with our daughters. Aizu's sake, and cotton, Sazaedo Temple etc. along with the beautiful nature, products and history; Aizu has it all. This is the best place in the world, but I plan on doing some traveling overseas once I

Mikiko: I plan on doing some downsizing while we are still here. "Will you travel with him?" Of course. That was never even a question.
