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



Spring Booster Period (1 shot)

May 8th to August 31st 2023

Eligibility: (received the initial dose (1st/2nd shots), and their booster more than 3 months ago)

- 65+
- Aged 5-64 with underlying conditions/are high risk
- Work in healthcare, high risk facilities

COVID-19 booster vouchers will be sent out in order of eligibility. *If you still have an unused voucher, you may use that instead*





With more people going out, and attending events and parties, the chance of catching COVID-19 or another illness is still present. I was quite sick this month and so I decided to call this hotline to get some advice. They connected me with an interpreter who helped me convey my situation and symptoms to the Prefectural Health Hotline. The interpreter was so kind, and thorough in her interpretation that I felt really looked after. If you are worried about COVID-19, I highly recommend using this service. They will get you all the help you need. Plus! It's over LINE, so you don't need to worry about extra charges on your phone bill. (Back in 2020 I had over 3000yen in extra charges after having to call the health hotline myself)

"Here" Became Home - Katie Gunzenhauser

To a group of American students, Aizu-Wakamatsu was the final destination of a ten-day exploration of Japan's Shogun Era. With a giddy nervousness in the air, host families whisked each of us away to neighboring communities. They welcomed us warmly and quickly and we dove into a whirlwind of gardens, ponds, shrines, temples, sake breweries, noodle shops, and homemade family dinners. Many of us practiced calligraphy, participated in tea ceremonies, dressed in kimono or yukata, and explored our families' favorite restaurants and hot spots in the city. Using a combination of Japanese, English, and Google Translate, we got to know each other and explore shared interests. This experience showed us that living with a family or welcoming a visitor is an intimate way for people to

really get to know each other's unique lifestyles and cultures.

From my experience with the Kikuchi family, I noticed that we formed the type of bond that surpasses friendship and is immediately familial. Even the family parakeet, Pii-chan, hopped on my shoul-

der and chirped loudly during my first night in their home. I got to know my wise sister Hana as a fellow student learning the ropes of adulthood, and my younger sister, Mako, as one with an exuberant and contagious personality. My host mother

was shy and kind, and my father was outgoing and lively. I was even warmly welcomed into family video chats with my host-brother and grandparents. The family was well-balanced with energy

and love, which was easy to fit in. From my understanding, my fellow students felt as affectionate and comfortable towards their families as I did, even over our mere two-day

> During the railway back to Tokyo, all of us remorsefully reflected that the visit happened too quickly, we'd have to come back, and we were grateful for the Aizu-Wakamatsu International Association and community members who made our final days in Japan more rewarding than

the best dishes I have ever tasted. Kanna-san and I went to the bathhouse after a day-long adventure of trying on kimonos, learning sado, and wandering around temples. I made a connection with her that will last several lifetimes.



Recently, I sent the Miyazaki's a letter, and I follow Kanna-san on Instagram. I am learning Japanese in school, and study hard so that when I return, I can talk to them fully. Hopefully by then, Dai-chan will be a little less of a noisy boy (and also stop stealing my strawberries!), and I can finally talk to him too. For, I believe, it is important to go home once and awhile and to check in on the ones you love.
